WHAT IS TEEN DATING VIOLENCE?

Teen Dating Violence (or T.D.V.) refers to physical, emotional, sexual, financial, or technological abuse that one person in a relationship uses to gain power and control over the other person in that relationship.



Jessica and Jordan quickly become a couple, eating lunch, doing homework and walking home each day, together. In the beginning, they were having a lot of fun.







In line number one she says, "Remember those walls I built, well, baby, they're tumbling down. And they didn't even put up a fight, they didn't even make a sound." This is an example of a healthy relationship because some people put their walls up because there isn't a lot of trust between them. In this line she is saying they are gaining trust at that moment. Trust is important to have between two people in a relationship.

In the next line she says "It's like I've been awakened. It's the risk that I'm taking. Every rule I had you break it, I'm never gonna shut you out." This also shows trust because when she says she had to break some of the rules, she is saying that she trusts him now despite the fact that sometimes it's risky to have trust with someone. A relationship without trust would be unhealthy.

I took away a star for this line because it shows that the person she's singing about is all she can think about.
